Re: Budget Trailer Bill Language Regarding Strong Workforce Program

Dear Mr. Ferguson:

The Academic Senate for California Community Colleges is writing to express our concerns regarding the allocation of funding for the Strong Workforce Program in the 2016 Budget Trailer Bill. Section 308 of the Trailer Bill as written would direct funding through a fiscal agent chosen by each regional collaborative.

The recommendations of the 2015 Board of Governors Task Force on Workforce, Job Creation, and a Strong Economy demonstrate a recognition of the important role of career technical education (CTE) programs in supporting the overall economic integrity of the State of California. Recent practice has been to direct funding for CTE programs through regional consortia or collaboratives. This practice has in many cases led to uneven allocation of resources, inability to sufficiently fund some existing CTE programs, and missed opportunities for program development and improvement.

The 2016 California Budget Trailer Bill currently allocates \$200 million of ongoing Prop 98 funding to support CTE programs and workforce development through the Strong Workforce Program, and this infusion of funding for CTE and workforce programs is very much appreciated by the faculty in the community college system. However, the Trailer Bill language again directs this funding to be allocated through regional collaboratives. Such a method of allocation will impede the ability of colleges to serve their local communities and, based on past experience, will channel the funding toward newly developed programs instead of providing the badly needed support for existing programs that serve far more students.

Whatever the final amount of funding for the Strong Workforce Program may be, it could be better used to serve the students and the economy of California if it were allocated directly to community college districts rather than regional consortia.

For these reasons, the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges urges that, to the greatest degree possible, the funding for the Strong Workforce Program be allocated directly to districts rather than to regional collaboratives.
