
California Community Colleges with High Concentrations of College-Eligible Parolees (Excluding LA County)



Based on current college-eligible active parolees less than a 30 minute drive from the community college, non-overlapping perimeters. 8.11.16



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- Based on addresses of active parolees as of August 2016 for parolees with a High School Diploma, GED or equivalency, or testing at or above the tenth grade level.
- Does not include formerly incarcerated individuals who are no longer on active parole, and does
 not include individuals on probation. The addresses of active parolees is a proxy for all formerly
 incarcerated students but cannot be considered to be an exact match and may contain
 inaccuracies.
- This map does not include colleges based in Los Angeles County. Given the population distribution in California, Los Angeles County colleges consistently dominate the list if they are included. It is respectfully suggested that Los Angeles County be considered separately, despite the fact that it contains multiple community college districts. The County has a well-established network of criminal justice agencies, community groups, and partnerships that is not duplicated in the rest of the state; these agencies, groups and partnerships are almost all County-based. The proximity of the Los Angeles colleges would allow them to develop a community of practice without much travel, and the Los Angeles community of practice can be coordinated with the larger statewide efforts.
- Some districts, like those in the Bay Area, may be underrepresented in the map because they have lower incarceration rates. Lower incarceration rates mean these counties have fewer people on active parole, although they may still have large numbers of formerly incarcerated residents.
- The map also excludes some districts with active faculty and community involvement in the success of formerly incarcerated students, such as Peralta and Southwestern.
- Mapping driving distance in areas where the colleges are close together would result in a potential student being counted for multiple colleges, because the student is a short driving distance from many colleges. The attached map assigns each student to his/her closest district, so that each student is counted only once. If the map data is run with overlapping districts (i.e., all potential students within a 30 minute drive are counted for each college, even if students are counted for more than one college), the colleges below have high concentrations. This also excludes colleges located in Los Angeles County. One is in the Sacramento area, one is in the San Diego area, and the remainder are concentrated in Orange, Riverside, and western San Bernardino counties:

 - o Riverside City College (Riverside CCD)
 - o San Bernardino Valley College (San Bernardino CCD)
 - o Golden West College (Coast CCD)
 - o Coastline Community College (Coast CCD)
